Dear Shepherd of the Mountains,

The word vocation comes from the Latin vocare, to call. As Lutherans, we think of God calling us through the Holy Spirit to certain ministries and people. A teacher is called to work with a certain age group or subject. A doctor is called to specialize in a field or with a particular population. A pastor is called to be a steward of word and sacrament for a congregation. Vocation is not always professional: we can be called to be a friend, a spouse, a parent; a parishioner. What's hard about this life is that sometimes being called to necessarily means being called away.

Late in January, I was unexpectedly invited into a call process in Minnesota (the flatland! I did not think it would be a long conversation.) It turns out my connection to this congregation began here in Jackson. Years ago, I officiated a tiny wedding on a hill above Jackson Lake. The brother-in-law of the bride (the head of the religion department at St. Olaf College) brought forward my name for Bethel Lutheran Church's consideration. As I learned more about this congregation, I was drawn into further conversation, and my sense of call grew stronger and stronger.

And yet, to be called into these new possibilities necessarily means being called away from Shepherd of the Mountains. My strong emotions are a testimony to our time and work together: as much as there is energy and joy in this decision, I am also grieving leaving you and Jackson Hole. This new call itself is a testimony to you: you have shaped me to be the pastor chosen to lead this vibrant congregation in the heart of Lutherland (still a foreign territory to this Alaskan!) I am a better pastor and person because of my time here, and I am so grateful for how you have already been lifting and supporting me for what comes next.

The technical stuff: my last Sunday worshipping with you will be July 4. I will be taking a "stay-packing-cation" through July 18th (officiating a wedding on the 17th!) before going on the road and landing in Northfield, MN – and I assume being indoctrinated in all things Bethel, St. Olaf, and the mysteries of the prairies. I am hoping rivers and lakes will shape me as much as the mountains have.

Support is in the wings as you navigate what comes next: in Rev. Phil Misner, the Assistant to the Bishop who has a special attachment to you all, in Rev. Ben Nardi, the faithful pastor who has helped you through transition in the past, and in Rev. Eric Moehring, the recently retired ELCA pastor who has often assisted both us and St. Francis Episcopal with worship. The St. John's Episcopal and Presbyterian Church in Jackson Hole clergy are holding us in prayer as well.

Beloved, I will savor our last board meetings, studies, and fellowship times as your pastor. I am so thankful and proud to have shared life and ministry with you, and you will always have my gratitude, my love, and my prayers. As I joyfully anticipate this new call, I am also looking forward to seeing what you do next, trusting that the Holy Spirit will be guiding our respective ways forward.

May the protection, peace, and push of the Triune God surround and carry us into what is yet to be.

What's next?

After Pastor Inger departs, we will focus on discernment. We will utilize supply pastors and have emergency pastoral care arranged for about a month as the council works with the synod to arrange an interim pastor. **Bishop Kristen Kuempel** is tentatively planning to worship with us July 25th!

Self-reflection

Who are we? Who are our neighbors? Where is God leading us next?

The congregation forms a Call Committee to work closely with the Interim Pastor to engage these questions and prepare an updated Ministry Site Profile (MSP).

The call committee will then use the MSP and our stated needs to find our next pastor.

discernment continues: who we hope for

Call Committee & Candidates

- The call committee reviews prospective candidates with the synod office, conducts interviews, and hosts final candidate(s) for an on-site visit and interview. Candidates are presented in slates of 2-3 persons (if a first call candidate is considered, that candidate will be presented as a slate of 1).
- If in this process, it seems like a candidate will not meet the needs of the congregation after all, their name is returned and these steps are repeated with new candidates until the call committee selects the candidate of their choice to present to the council.
- If the Council agrees with the Call Committee recommendation, a special meeting of the congregation is arranged. Only one name will be considered by the congregation.
- If the congregation votes to move forward, a letter of call shall be signed by the President and Secretary of the congregation and sent to the synod office for attestation by this bishop.
- The pastor usually decides to accept the call within a few weeks. In the event the pastor does not accept, the call committee shall continue the process.

A warm welcome

Once a call has been accepted, starting dates and an installation service are planned!

The Call Committee or another task group appointed by Council may be charged with the tasks of helping the new pastor settle into the community (finding a doctor, bank, schools, vet, etc).
