## The Call from Tomorrow

Dear Shepherd of the Mountains,

I have a healthy respect for the Holy Spirit. As a child, I always envisioned a wind at my back, assisting my efforts. In seminary, I had a rude awakening.

I had plans for my internship, you see. Plans to round out my east coast seminary formation with a dose of the west, plans to live in New Mexico with my brother and sister-in-law. My candidacy committee had other ideas. They asked me to apply for an international internship. I was so caught off guard I didn't even ask why. I remember protesting – "I have a dog!" They were unmoved. "And?"

When I was first accepted into the Horizon Internship Program, I matched with a site in Belgium where the intern was going to work with both a congregation and a NATO military base. I began making plans to learn French. I had ideas about tall men and beer. Then the call came that the housing had fallen through. Horizon offered a site in Malaysia as an alternative. Was this the Holy Spirit or church bureaucracy? The Alaskan in me whimpered as I looked at the 90 degree temps and averages of 74-86% humidity.

Heat and humidity aside, my year in Kuala Lumpur was deeply formative, stretching and strengthening me. In the words of Pentecost favorite "Spirit of Gentleness," I began to recognize the Spirit that stings and goads, that in her wisdom led to places I hadn't imagined.

So I braced myself as I neared graduation for the first call process. What would this look like? My prayers still sometimes devolved into *Please not the Great Plains*. *Please not the Great Plains*. This time, however, the Spirit was attentive to my hopes. I remember "Knocking on Heaven's Door" came on as I drove into Jackson Hole for my in-person interview. Here, I have known the Spirit as calling and free.

Malaysia and Jackson Hole don't have much in common. Yet in spite of vast cultural differences, "church is church," and the Holy Spirit is present in both - gathering Luther House Chapel and Shepherd of the Mountains around the font and table, opening ears to God's word, and sending us out to serve the neighbor.

The final verse of the hymn talks about the Holy Spirit's activity in our times, in our lives:

You call from tomorrow, you break ancient schemes. From the bondage of sorrow all the captives dream dreams; our women see visions, our men clear their eyes. With bold new decisions your people arise.

The pandemic wilderness has forced us to hold plans loosely, trusting on God for daily provision rather than some sort of strategic plan. Shepherd of the Mountains is too young to be ancient, but perhaps we've still held old patterns and ideas for what is to be done and how to do things... patterns that have been broken up this year. I think of Bishop Kirsten's Synod Assembly sermon, wondering if hands need to be empty so that they are ready to receive God's new thing. We have known sorrow this year – the sorrow of lost time and grave illness, of loneliness, of disagreement. But even here, the Holy Spirit calls from tomorrow, into new life. What dreams are you being given for Shepherd of the Mountains?

May you honor the fire in your belly, the wind stinging your eyes, and the wind at your back. In my experience, these are all signs the Holy Spirit is on the move.



Now that anyone who wants one can get the vaccine, there have been many updates to Covid risk management. The CDC issued "Choosing Safer Activities" on April 27th. The Worship Board met April 29th and made the following recommendations:

- 1) We are delighted to be offering in-person worship every week. Even if there is a return to moderate risk (orange), we are comfortable enough with our protocols and vaccine availability that we will continue offering weekly in-person worship. In the event of the community being at high risk (red), we will tighten protocols but continue to offer weekly in-person options.
- 2) We ask parishioners to continue to wear masks in the building. In an abundance of caution, we will continue to use full bulletins rather than our hymnals and modify how we collect the offering. We are going to try communion with one kind (bread) so that we can share one loaf.
- 3) The worship leaders may choose to remove their masks for preaching, reading, or leading prayers. The worship leaders will wear masks at other times.

4) Now that the vaccine is available to everyone and vaccination rates are rising, we can begin to sing softly with our masks!
