

Encouraged by Love

Dear Shepherd of the Mountains,

As I was preparing for tiny desk worship this week, it was an honor to spend time remembering the saints who have gone before us this past year, to glimpse the cloud of witnesses you claim in your own lives, and to be introduced to some of the older stories of the congregation (extra thanks to Rose Jeske for helping find pictures when I only had names.). The apostle Paul reminds us of others - the saints of Hebrew scripture: Abraham, Moses, and other Israelite heroes.

But we don't just remember those who went before because it's a nice thing to do, or because they sometimes have cool stories. I think we remember because our faith claims that we are still tethered together by God's love, by God's promise that death does not ultimately separate us. Even as I was hunched over my computer, alone in my office, I felt enfolded by that love that had been made tangible in so many lives. When even before the pandemic began, 3 out of 5 Americans reported being lonely, to be wrapped in that love is no small thing.

And we remember so that we may be encouraged:
 "Therefore, since we are surrounded by so great a cloud of witnesses, let us also lay aside every weight and the sin that clings so closely, and let us run with perseverance the race that is set before us, looking to Jesus the pioneer and perfecter of our faith, who for the sake of the joy that was set before him endured the cross..." Hebrews 12:1-2

Every weight and the sin that clings so closely. It's as if we often surround ourselves with anxiety and self-centeredness, seeking a static protection. Instead, Paul reminds us of the protection of living love, a protection that frees us for movement and nimbleness and a purpose beyond ourselves.

Let us lay aside every weight.
 The weight of the endless conversations over in-person or online worship.
 The weight of who will win the election, and when we will find out results.
 Important things, surely, but sometimes it seems they narrow our vision, making us lose sight of the race set before us *to be church*.

The church's work continues regardless of whether we worship in-person or online, or in some hybrid form; the church has work to do regardless of who wins an election.
 Drawing from our baptismal promises:
 How are we proclaiming Christ through word and deed in this time of pandemic?
 How are we caring for others and the world God made?
 How are we working for justice and peace?

Encouraged by the saints who have gone before,
 tethered to them and to each other by Christ's love,
 let us keep our eyes on Jesus and persevere as church together.


Tiny Desk Worship will be available in the evening.

What Parishioners Can Do

Please stay home and join our tiny desk worship if:

- You are not comfortable with in-person gatherings or are a "high risk" individual.
- You, or someone in your family, is ill.
- You have had a fever in the past 72 hours, cough, or have lost your taste or smell.
- You have traveled to a COVID high risk area and need to self-quarantine for 14 days.



Coming Back Together

If you choose to attend an in-person worship:

- Please use your bathroom at home before coming to the church building.
- Dress warmly — Windows will be open for air flow and to reduce the virus load in the sanctuary.
- Face masks must be worn at all times.
- Maintain a distance of 6 feet from others.
- Hand sanitizer will be available—please use it!
- A contact tracing log will be kept at each service; please let the ushers know your name and phone number prior to entering worship.
- Bulletins will contain the whole service. Bulletins will not be handed out—please pick one up from the table on your way into the service. All hymnals have been removed from the sanctuary.
- Sit in designated chairs and rows; they will be marked to help ensure physical distancing.
- Passing of the Peace will be verbal and touchless. Please remain in your chairs.
- There will be no singing.
- Place your donation in the offering plate located at the back of the sanctuary.
- No congregating or socializing in the church building before or after the service.
- Children must be supervised by parents at all times.
- The church will be cleaned prior to each worship service.

Having Communion

We will celebrate a physically distanced communion. Each household should bring their own bread (see the micro communion bread recipe below!) and a small amount of wine or grape juice (Pastor Inger regularly uses a small jelly jar). Parishioners will stay in their places as Pastor Inger consecrates the elements from afar. Households can serve each other; individuals will hear God's word of invitation from Pastor Inger (and the assisting minister will be that voice for her).

Ingredients

- 4 1/2 tsp wheat flour
- 2 pinches baking powder
- 2 pinches salt
- 1/8 tsp oil
- 1 1/4 tsp very hot water
- 1 1/2 tsp honey

Directions

- Heat oven to 350
- Mix together dry ingredients
- Mix water, honey, and oil together; add dry ingredients
- Shape dough into a circle about 1/4" thick and score a cross on top.
- Bake for 5-7 minutes.


Kelly Sherman-Conroy

we praise you, O God.



A Passage

Led on by Christ and the saints before us, death loses its sting. The cross becomes a way of transformation.

"Death as an image for the path of transformation points to a dying to the world of conventional wisdom as the center of one's security and identity and a dying to self as the center of one's concern. It is a striking image for the path of spiritual transformation. Not only is death the ultimate letting go, and thus the opposite of the grasping that marks the life of conventional wisdom, but the process may often involve the stage we have come to associate with the physical process of dying: denial, anger, bargaining, depression, and acceptance. The path of death is also, for Jesus, the path to new life. It results in rebirth, a resurrection to a life centered in God."

Dear members of the Shepherd of the Mountains Family,

I miss seeing you all and wish everyone God's Peace during this challenging time.

As a member of the church family and Treasurer for the congregation, I need to let you know how we are doing financially and ask for your support and cooperation. It is not surprising that our offerings have dropped since we stopped worshipping together at church. In September, our general offering was \$7,026 while our budget requires \$9,500 to meet expenses. At the end of September, our year-to-date income was \$124,126 and our expenditures \$119,261, for a net revenue of \$4,865. This positive number is only because we received a Paycheck Protection Program loan of \$17,317 that we expect to be forgiven, a \$6,000 grant from the synod to pay for Ron Fabry's benefits, a designated gift of \$1,000 toward Pastor Inger's new computer, and a grant from the State of Wyoming for \$1,748 which paid for the computer. We also received an extra offering of \$20,000 in July from an incredibly generous member after our mid-year individual giving reports were sent out. This out-of-the-ordinary revenue has allowed us to be even with where we were last year at this time.

My concern now is for the future. We cannot depend on out-of-the-ordinary funds; we need to be able to meet our budget with our regular giving. With that in mind, we will be holding a Stewardship Drive this fall. We need to know how much money we can expect to receive from our members so we can prepare the budget for 2021. We've had members move away, leave the congregation, and suffer financial hardship during this pandemic, which is understandable, therefore, we need to be prudent and responsible as we prepare for next year.

Enclosed with this letter is a Stewardship pledge form. Please prayerfully consider next year's offering to Shepherd of the Mountains as you fill out the form. No matter what amount you can give, it is crucial that you return the pledge form so that the church can create a realistic budget for 2021. We are fortunate that we do not have a church or parsonage mortgage, but we do have our normal operating expenses of payroll, utilities, insurance, maintenance, and program support that must be paid. Your Stewardship pledge will give us a good idea of our income for 2021 so we can program our expenses for the upcoming year. Please mail your pledge to the church by the end of November. November and December are busy months with the holidays so the sooner we can have figures on which to base our budget, the better.

Also included with this letter is your third-quarter individual offering report. If you see you are behind in your giving to the church and are able to make up the difference, please do so.

I hope that all of you all are safe and that you have the Peace of the Lord in your hearts. Thank you for your pledge and support.


